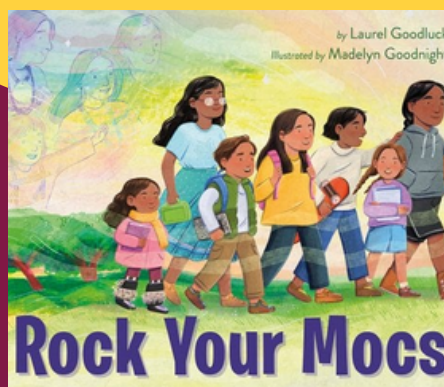

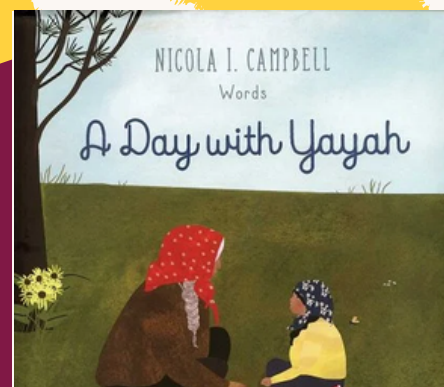
Still This Love Goes On

Celebrate Indigenous traditions of honor, nature and community based Indigenous Cree knowledge.



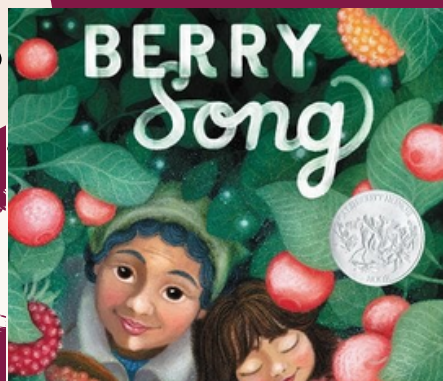
Rock Your Mocs

Celebrate the joy and power of wearing moccasins and the Native pride that comes with them.



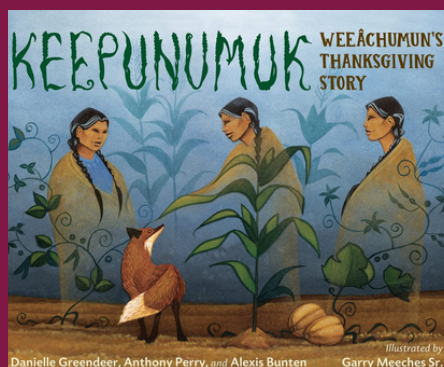
A Day with Yayah

A grandmother passes on the knowledge of plants and the natural world to her grandchild.



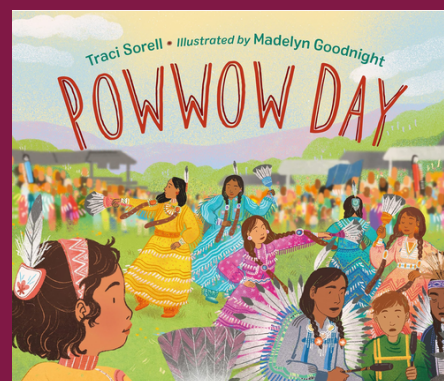
Berry Song

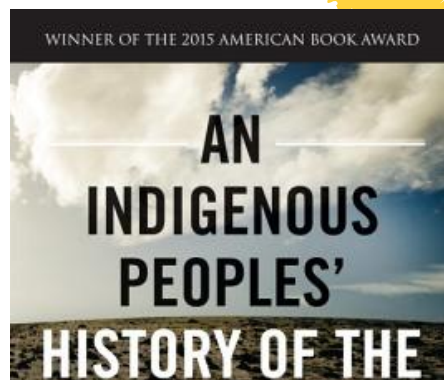

The first history of the U.S. written from an Indigenous perspective.



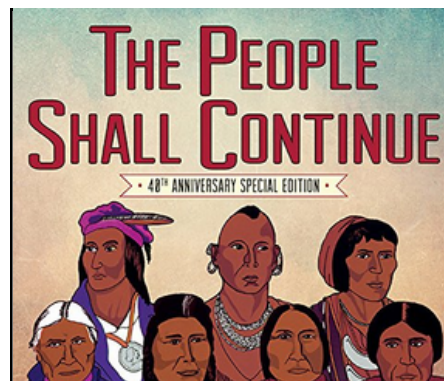
The Water Walker

The story of a determined Ojibwe Grandmother (Nokomis) and her great love for Nibi (water).



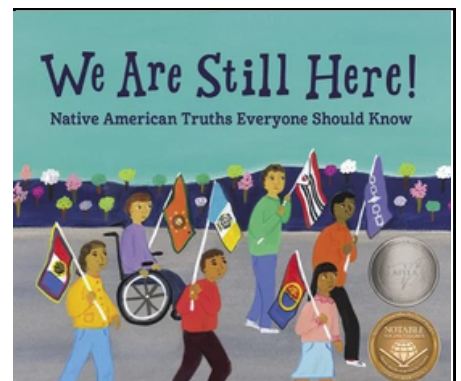
Dragonfly Kites/Pimithaagansa
